## What's been going on?

As you can imagine this last year has been very different from previous years in terms of what the parish council have been up to. The start of last year saw us launching "Wigginton Help Scheme" and "Wigginton Support Fund" to help the residents of Wigginton through the Covid crisis. Through these schemes we helped to get neighbours in touch with one another and offer assistance where necessary, we ran and continue to run a successful delivery of medicines from Rothschild House Surgery to village members, and through the fundraising of the Support fund we are able to reimburse St Bartholomew's School for the food parcels they have been supplying.

We too have had to adapt, holding our monthly meetings on zoom and having to discuss and make decisions remotely, which has thrown new challenges and a very different way of working, but we have carried on through and continued to maintain and improve our beautiful village, a real testament to the Parish Council team.

A few changes you will have noticed around the village include posts around the car park

and new benches in the sports field. The recreation ground has had the missing benches reinstated, a new gate fitted and the Wilding area is starting to grow.

We continue to monitor all areas of the village; the play area, gym equipment, footpaths and highways, keeping on top of litter and maintenance as best we can. We have recently adopted the defibrillator outside the pub and now have a service contract in place for it, and are constantly topping up the dog poo bags! We try our best to act quickly if we find something, or something is reported and value any feedback we get from the residents, we are here for your benefit!

We try to carry out a survey every year to gauge your ideas for the village and where you would like to see the money spent. This year the survey is available to complete online as well as inserted into this publication. We value and appreciate every response as it guides us and inspires us to do the best job we possibly can, please take a few minutes to take part.

## Note from the Chair

What a year we have had. Apart from those of us who can still remember WW2, this has been the most challenging year on record. I know everyone has experienced the challenges of COVID in different ways and many people in the village have lost friends and family during this time and it has been particularly difficult that we have not been able to gather, to mourn and say farewell to those we have lost. On a personal note, I feel the loss of two outstanding members of our community, both of whom contributed so much to our village.

Glen Adams, who was both a dear friend and a fantastic community man. Glen was a Parish Councillor for many years. He was part of the team that organised our incredible Wigginton Fireworks display every year and he also organised several other charity events, most notably a hugely successful event for Motor Neuron disease, raising thousands of pounds for the charity.

Simon Crichton, was another community man who is sorely missed. With Simon's commercial background, he helped to get our lovely village shop off the ground, and continued to volunteer as the finance manager. Simon was very well known for his garden shed brewed Ale, which he supplied to the shop for the village to enjoy, a hobby that he turned into a small business. Simon also sat on the board of governors for St. Barts, our lovely village school.

Our hearts go out to Glen and Simon's family and friends; they are truly missed.

As I write this, it would appear that the country is doing well in the battle against COVID. Our vaccine rollout is progressing, and businesses are opening up again. It has been wonderful to see some more life in the village again, with the Greyhound and the Village shop back open and serving food and drinks, albeit just in their outside spaces for now. I would like to take this

opportunity to thank the staff and owners of both businesses for all their help during these difficult times.

The Greyhound has erected marquees with heaters, and also has several tables on the lawn for when the sun shines. They have also just received a 5-star hygiene rating. I know that the Landlord was running 5 pubs before the COVID pandemic, and is now running 2. It's been a tough time for the catering industry. Let's make sure we support our local pub when we can; the village wouldn't be the same without the Greyhound.

The Village shop management and all the volunteers have done an outstanding job over the last year. They have kept the shop open, and supplied the villagers with the many essentials we have needed. They have been running a delivery service to vulnerable and shielding individuals, and been a true example of a community pulling together. The shop has planning permission to extend the patio area with an 8 x 5 metre meter patio, complete with umbrellas and seating. Again, we must continue to support our local business, what would our Village be like without the Village shop!

I would also like to thank David Wilde (exchairman WPC). He was very thorough in his approach to being a councillor, and his enthusiasm has remained as he now pushes forward with sustainable Wigginton.

Other thanks must go out to all the volunteers in the village. The people who continue to help run the village shop, those who delivered prescriptions and grocery shops, those who delivered takeaways from the pub and a special mention to Sarah Ryan, who sang her heart out from her driveway on Hemp Lane keeping our spirits up during lockdown.

Last but not least I would like to thank Stuart Fordyce for 5 years of exemplary service as our accounts and finance Councillor. Stuart has looked after all the financial obligations of the



council, and will be a hard act to follow.

# Support Wigginton in getting Ultra-Fast Broadband

The parish council is supporting a community effort to upgrade our internet connection to ultrafast broadband. Ultrafast broadband will bring incredibly fast internet to Wigginton, including houses that currently get low speeds due to their distance from the cabinet, and is far more stable and reliable than our existing connection.

A fast reliable internet connection is becoming a modern-day necessity. Homeworking, home-schooling, our primary school and local small businesses are dependent on a fast and stable network; and technology will deliver more and novel online services in future that will need speed.

The rural nature of our village with homes spread over a large area means we are low down in the queue as upgrades to gigabit internet roll out across the country. However, by acting together in a community fibre partnership we can bring ultrafast broadband to Wigginton far more quickly.

Your support will help the whole community and we encourage you to join the campaign. A community website has been set up to help co-ordinate the community fibre partnership with Openreach, and to provide more details on how we can bring ultrafast broadband to our village:

## Everybody's Cheering!!

The Parish Council have continued to support local youth football club Berkhamsted Raiders FC with the continued use of the Wigginton Sports Field for the 2020/21 Season. Last year we agreed additional use of the pitch which included circa 80 weekend matches spread over the season on both Saturday and Sunday. The global pandemic obviously had a huge impact on the number of games played last year however with grass roots sport now back up and running we expect the usage to increase back to the approved levels.

The relationship between Wigginton Parish Council and the Berkhamsted Raiders has never been stronger enabling both girls and boys' junior football to be played in a safe and well-maintained environment.

In 2020 the Raiders with the support of the Council approved grant funding providing up to £2,100 excluding VAT. This money was to go towards new drainage for the pitch that would improve the surface and make it more playable during all the conditions our good old British weather throws at us. Unfortunately, this has been delayed due to COVID but we expect this work to be completed for the 2021/22 season.

There have however been some great additions to the pitch during these challenging

times including fantastic new goal posts improving the match play experience as well as wooden posts being erected on the car park side of the pitch to avoid cars driving onto the field and damaging the playing surface. We have also allowed the raiders to have a small storage unit to hold their match day equipment including goal nets and corner flags.

It is great to have grass roots sport back in the village with the sound of cheering injecting life back into the community on sunny weekends!

We wish the Raiders luck in their upcoming season.

## Sustainable Wigginton

As you may recall, in June 2019 the Parish Council declared a Climate Emergency and launched a community consultation together with Sustainable Wigginton. Following an open meeting they developed an Action Plan which was adopted by the PC in December 2019. It can be viewed on the PC's website.

It is a list of actions to combat climate change and improve the sustainability of our lives which can be taken by us as individuals, as a village and as a society. Implementation is being led by SW.

#### Achievements up to May 2020 included:

- Tree planting: In autumn 2019 Members of SW and others helped at a mass tree planting of native species at the Woodland Trust's 63-acre extension to Tring Park.
- Sale of quality second-hand clothes in January 2020: this sale diverted many

good clothes away from recycling or landfill and raised £370 for the charity DENS.

 Heat Loss Surveys for Homes in early 2020: SW carried out surveys of 17 homes in the village with a thermal imaging camera to help identify areas of heat loss.
 We provided reports with noncommercial advice how to remedy problems.

Despite the pandemic putting a slight brake on our activities, as we could not meet or hold events indoors, we have made great progress with the "Wilding the Rec" project. Thanks to the Wigginton Gardeners and the Parish Council for their funding and support. The project was started in June 2020 and is ongoing, see following article.

In January 2021 the PC together with SW applied to Dacorum for a Green Community grant to set up "the 56 Club" which will be a gardening club for parents and children. We

are delighted to announce that we were awarded £400 in late March, to get this project off the ground - see the separate article.



Once covid restrictions are relaxed we hope to be able to organise more sustainable events and actions and would welcome your involvement! If you would like to get involved with no fixed commitment - please get in touch we would be delighted to hear from you!

## Wilding the Rec

This project is to create a native wildflower meadow in the south-west part of the recreation ground (on Vicarage Road) whilst leaving the mown area for ball games. The area is just under an acre. The objectives are:

- By planting native wildflowers, to encourage butterflies, bees and other insects which in turn will be good for the birds and mammals which feed on them.
- To increase the community's understanding and appreciation of the value of native species and biodiversity.
- To avoid using pesticides, weedkillers, slug pellets or other chemicals wherever possible.
- To create an area which anyone can enjoy, by walking through it, or sitting on the benches.

We began the project in June 2020 by ceasing mowing of the area, apart from curving paths through it. We were delighted to see at least 7 varieties of native wildflowers appear over the course of the summer. These are perennial plants already within the turf which have tolerated mowing. Some people would call them weeds (!) but they are beautiful and valuable to wildlife.

With funding from the Wigginton Gardeners and the Parish Council, we were able to buy goo wildflower bulbs and 3 mixes of wildflower seeds. Our team of local volunteers trimmed overgrown bushes, built leaf and compost bins, carried out a late summer cut of the wilded area and prepared the ground by heavy raking.

Over the course of October and November we planted 900 bulbs of 8 types. The seed mixes were sown on a fine November day with the




help of pupils from St Bartholomew's School. They also planted 100 daffodils. The children really seemed to enjoy themselves!

As part of the plan to encourage wildlife, 4 bird boxes were put up in December, two on trees near the north boundary and two near the south. We will monitor these over the spring and hope that they are used for nesting. If you would like to sponsor another bird box please get in touch!

In late autumn one of the horse chestnuts on the west side had to be felled by the Parish Council, for safety reasons. The trunk and most of the timber was left on site as a habitat for invertebrates and small mammals.

Over the winter apart from some maintenance work we have just been waiting and hoping. Sure enough in February the snowdrops popped up, followed by daffodils, winter aconites, wild tulips and snakeshead fritillaries. The other bulbs, namely wild garlic, wood anemones and bluebells are showing only leaves at present. Please take a walk round and see which ones you can spot! We hope all will flower and increase in strength over the years. We hope the cornfield annuals, sown as seeds, will flower this year together with some of the perennials, and the remainder next year.



The mowing of the curving paths will commence during May. Early this year the Parish Council installed a

Early this year the Parish Council installed a bench and a picnic table in the wilded area and 2 more benches next to the public footpaths. This has made the area a very pleasant place to sit.



In April we excavated a bog in the SW corner, and we have now planted it up with about 120 plants, some just plugs, some established plants. Thanks to the Wigginton Gardeners and the Parish Council for their funding and support.

We hope you will enjoy the wilded area!

# Who's Building What?

Dacorum's planning department is responsible for reviewing all planning applications for developments within the borough. It passes judgment based on appropriateness of the development to the local environment as defined by the Planning Policy and taking into account Green Belt and ANOB guidelines.

Wigginton Parish Council is consulted on all plans submitted for development within the parish boundary. These are discussed at our monthly meetings and listed in advance in the agenda which is published on the Parish Council Website. Anyone interested is free to attend and make their own comments.

WPC can either support, object or make no comment on applications. If we "no comment" then Dacorum's decision follows the planning officers' recommendation. If we take a view which is opposite to the planning officer's then the application goes before the development control committee. Interested parties, including the applicant, are entitled to speak at the committee meeting. Our comments and the decisions made by the Dacorum are published in the minutes of our meetings which are available on the website.

During the global pandemic we have seen an up rise in planning applications due to people spending more time at home and wanting to



make improvements as well as a number of new residents to the village wanting to redevelop. We have seen some really imaginative designs this year including state of the art ECO homes which work in great partnership to the sustainable ethos but can cause controversy in the look, we wait to see the outcome of these applications.

Crime numbers in Wigginton remain very low compared to other local villages of similar population in Dacorum. There have been a few burglaries and theft from cars and recently garages and sheds have been targeted so it is always advisable to keep doors and windows locked and keep your property secure.

We presently have two PCSO's covering the Tring area including the surrounding villages, PCSO 6112 Martin Leadbitter and a newcomer PCSO 6562 Robert Gilyen. They patrol the village regularly in a police vehicle and hope to spend more time in the area in the coming months on e-bikes when possible. They are here to show a visible presence, conduct some crime enquiries and deal with anti-social behaviour issues. Hopefully following the relaxing of Covid-19 regs on 17<sup>th</sup> May they will start to attend the Village Shop location on a regular basis to have a friendly chat to the local community.

As a community we should all keep an eye on our neighbours and their properties and

always report anything suspicious to the police.

During the pandemic we have continued to maintain our two open spaces, supporting the play area and the work of Sustainable Wigginton's wilding area, facilitating the efforts of hirers to improve the football pitch, adding new seating, and overseeing maintenance contracts for safety, grass and hedge cutting and litter picking. Nonetheless our surplus for the year was greater than expected, giving us extra resource for the future, and we have restricted the precept to last years level, a cost of roughly 42p per week for an average household. When reserves earmarked for specific purposes are deducted from our total funds, the resulting general reserve is equivalent to one years expenditure which we regard as prudent and is within the guidelines applicable to small parish councils.

### **Local Plan**

Dacorum recently held a consultation on the new Dacorum Local Plan, which set out the planning details for the future of our communities and the borough.

Whilst the proposed developments did not affect Wigginton directly, the plan proposed a substantial increase to the number of houses in Tring, primarily built on Green belt land, which would have a knock-on effect in terms of traffic and services which could impact Wigginton residents. Whilst the parish council agrees with the broad principles behind the vision, it had concerns over the way in which they were being implemented.

The parish council provided feedback on the plan detailing these concerns, and also cosigned a letter from other local parish councils who shared similar concerns. The details of the feedback submitted can be found on the Wigginton Parish Council Website.

Consultation on the plan ended on the 28<sup>th</sup> of February, and we are now awaiting the decision from Dacorum on how the plan will proceed.

St. Bartholomew's Church Wigginton has been on this site for over 900 years. The churchyard flora contains some rare wildflowers and some of the gravestones have a certain type of lichen that only grows on chalky ground and where the air is clean. We hold a Communion Service every 1st. Wednesday of the month at 9.30am and on Sundays there are 3 services, 8am Holy Communion, 10am Parish Eucharist and 6pm Evening Prayer.

Every month on a Saturday morning we run Messy Church from g-11am for our younger families, with breakfast, drawing and painting, story time and prayers (resuming when restrictions allow). The church is also used for a lot more activities, French classes, History Society meetings, wine talks to name just three and the fete is planned for the 4th September this year, with stalls, entertainers, BBQ, and local attractions. A concert is planned for October, The Bluebird Belles and an open-air theatre are performing again in August, all subject of course to Covid rules allowing by then.

# Looking after the village

#### **Hedges and Footpaths**

Spring has sprung, hedges and hedgerows are bursting into life......a timely reminder to us all to make sure our hedges are kept cut back sufficiently to allow free movement of pedestrians along our village pavements and footpaths, particularly bearing in mind the continuing need for social distancing. Hedges should be cut to the back of the footpath or highway boundary. Herts County Council has the right to cut back hedges which encroach the highway and obstruct visibility and then charge the owner for the work done.

Have you become a keen walker during lockdown, or maybe you have always been? Keep our footpaths and public rights of way open and in use. How about popping a pair of secateurs in your pocket to do on the spot maintenance ...stop that briar growing to block the footpath perhaps?

#### Parking and Speeding

Along with trimmed hedges, considerate parking will also keep our village pavements clear and safe for all. Please do not park on the

pavement as this could force pedestrians e.g. families with buggies and small children or wheelchair users to risk venturing into the road to pass inconsiderately parked vehicles. Parking in Chesham Road related to activities at the Sports Field, Village Shop and Play Area has not been an issue during lockdown, however, the Parish Council will continue to monitor the situation and look at various options to alleviate the issue should problems arise.

The Speed Indicator Device located on Chesham Road is a timely reminder to motorists to look at their speed, perhaps another strategically placed device or other measures would further reduce speed through the village?......comments or suggestions via the survey please! Herts CC agreed in principle to move the 40mph sign to beyond Beech Park some time ago, the Parish Council will continue to press for this to be actioned.

#### **Highways and Potholes**

Success to report! Substantial resurfacing was completed in Hemp Lane in recent months and blocked drains cleared. A small area at the bottom of Hemp Lane, however, remains badly surfaced and this has been reported to Herts CC. Welcome major resurfacing has also taken place at the junction of Chesham Road and Cholesbury Road.

Both Herts CC and Dacorum Borough Council provide an online portal to report problems relating to footpaths, bridleways, byways and highways ranging from potholes, street lighting, pavement issues, fly tipping, dog fouling, blocked road drains. This link leads to an A-Z of reporting issues and will then link through to the relevant Herts CC page for the issues for which they are responsible.

Please take the time to report faults and defects and provide photos if possible. All reported highways and footpath faults are inspected and graded by Herts CC as to severity. Holes greater than 50mm in depth or which are dangerous in some way e.g sharp edges are dealt with within 24 hours.

If you have any issues with footpaths and highways or any suggestions for improvements, please complete the Village Survey to let us know!
